

20 is Plenty (Speeding Concerns) – 14 May 2019

1. General introduction Bilbrough Village

Instances of speeding in the village continue to be reported to the Council. In the last week 3 separate instances have been reported involving speeding along Back Lane, and on Cat Lane adjacent to the junction to Back Lane. 95 Alive reports have been completed and are on their way to North Yorkshire Police, Fulford, York.

1.1 Speeding Update March 2019

- 95 Alive reports issued to all residents on Cat Lane and Back Lane Bilbrough by Cllr Warriner in January 2019.
- Formal 95 Alive complaints made:
 - One formal complaint made to Police by local resident on Cat Lane (Al Fox). Al received a reply from North Yorkshire Police (Traffic Bureau Support Officer) on 23.1.19. on this paperwork.
 - 2 complaints made by Holly Knight 11.5.19 speeding on Back Lane and junction Back Lane / Cat Lane – responses awaited
 - One complaint about to be submitted by Stewart Shanks concerning speeding on Cat Lane and Redhill Lane – **thought to be travelling in excess of 50 mph.**
 - It was suggested by one complainant that some of those speeding may be from Askham Bryan Agricultural College. **Action: Suggested we write to the College and mention speeding and ask for their co-operation to try and eliminate this.**
- On 25 January 2019 individuals were seen at key entry points into the village with speed cameras testing the speed of approaching vehicles. North Yorkshire Police confirmed to Julie the group was not from the Police.
- Main problem times of speeding are when diversion routes / traffic jams on A64 are in place but other general occurrences also.
- One 95 Alive form completion and receipt by Police now achieved and hence this may allow us to put up a 20 is Plenty sign in the village. It is believed this is the case.
- Name now achieved for 20 is Plenty campaign - **Bilbrough 20 is Plenty for Us**
- Barkston Ash Council still happy to come and share their knowledge of introducing 20 is Plenty campaign
- Cost of 20 is Plenty signage and associated costs for the village to be explored. Likely Barkston Ash contact will have this. **Action: John Phillips exploring this**
- Advertising of the campaign – once agreement is secured to progress the campaign, it is recommended that this be advertised by the following means:
 - Village Newsletter

- Village Noticeboards
- Bilbrough PC Website
- Stickers may be available for display for those who want them
- As above, contact to be made with Askham Bryan College to support campaign.
- 20 is Plenty Starting Pack awaited
- A call with the leader of the National 20 is plenty campaign needs to be arranged
- It is noted that Wales' First Minister has announced plans to introduce default 20mph speed limit for residential areas in Wales.

1.2 Options and associated Costs for introducing 20 is Plenty

A review of options has been undertaken with a summary of these and costs as below:

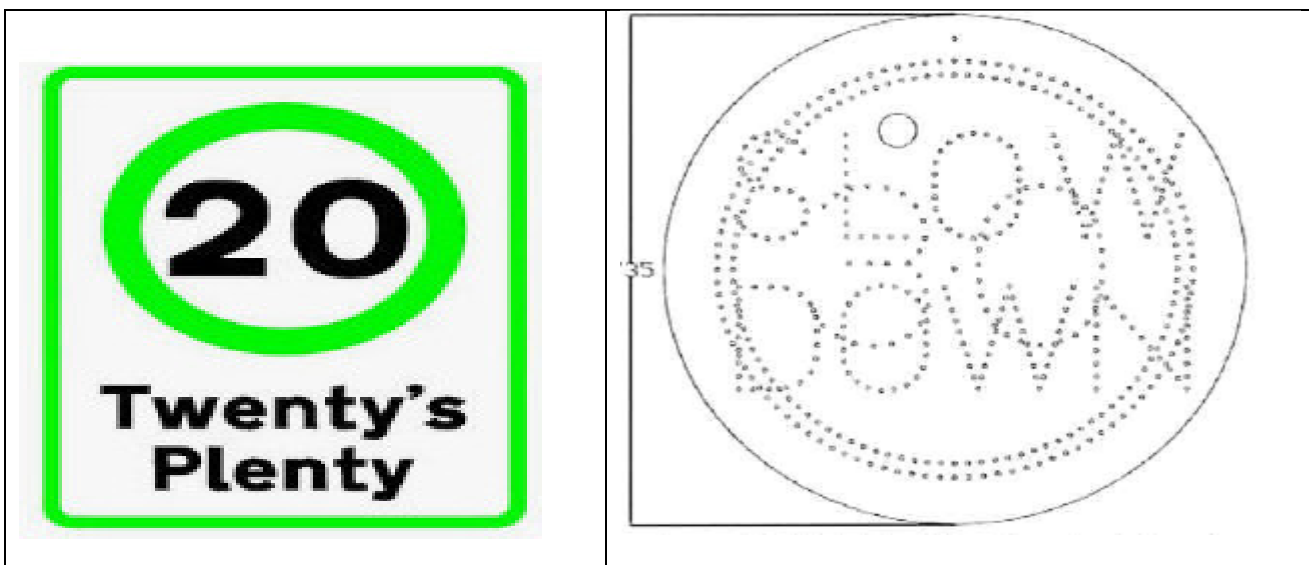
